Firefighters Grant (AFG) application period will be extended for one week due to Hurricane Irene response and recovery. The **NEW**

deadline for AFG applications is **September 16, 2011 at 5:00 p.m. EST**. This extension of time will allow our partners to address the immediate needs of their communities while providing adequate opportunity for them to apply for grant assistance under the AFG program. Hurricane Irene has affected a wide expanse of communities on the East Coast of the United States. FEMA recognizes that many of the eligible applicants for the AFG grant application period, that is presently open, are fire departments and non affiliated EMS de-

partments. FEMA understands that the most important focus should be on life and property. Applicants who are in the process of completing an application can continue. Please note that the FEMA system did not have any disruption of service due to the storm and therefore, information submitted to date is intact. If applicants have not started their applica-

tion yet, it's not too late. The AFG website has tools available to assist with preparing competitive applications (www.fema.gov/ firegrants). LEARN HOW YOU CAN PREPARE A SUCCESSFUL AFG APPLICATION

With nearly 20,000 applications each year, and limited funds available, the level of competition for AFG awards is high. Help to ensure that your application stands out from the crowd and scores well during the evaluation process by following these

tips:

This year, FEMA has designated High, Medium, and Low funding priorities for every eligible activity and/or item. This makes it easier for applicants to understand the programs FEMA is able to support. Use the priority system to increase your chances of winning an award. The more consistent your funding request is with the highest priority items, as described in the FY11 AFG Program Guidance, the greater your chances of winning an award.

Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). Requesting any item that does not result in state or national certification, or comply with recognized standards, may lower your application's evaluation score. For more

Applicants

should request only what they must have and only what they can justify. Requesting an excessively expensive brush truck, for exam-

The AFG Program is designed to help applicants meet state and national standards, such as those provided by the Occupational

ple, or asking for what appears to be a "wish list" item is not in your best interest and will result in a lower application score. Applicants make a critical mistake by requesting equipment with excessive or unreasonable costs.

A surprisingly large number of applications contain poorly written narratives that do not adequately define the risks in the community, the proposed solution, the financial situation of the organization, or the cost-benefit of the project. Additionally, applicants should avoid borrowing language from vendors and manufacturers. Such boilerplate language tends to be general in nature and does not describe the local need.

The Narrative must contain a clear picture of your department and its finances, your community and its need(s), as well as the project and its cost-benefit. It should be detailed and concise. Allow enough time to write a complete narrative. This is your opportunity to

What is the Brownfield Action Plan Pilot Program?

The **Brownfield Action Plan Pilot Program** seeks to meet the following objectives:

The Brownfield Action Plan Pilot Program is a new initiative that will use existing funds to assist communities in the expedited development and implementation of an area-wide Brownfield Action Plan. The pilot program will involve two parts: 1) technical assistance for development of a plan, and 2) subsequent grant funding from the Ohio Department of Development and partners to

2. Produce actionable deliverables for the community such as a brownfield priority list and action strategy for funding and redevelopment; and 3. Spur communities to **swiftly begin implementing** their strategy with local, state, and private funding sources. What kind of assistance is available?

The pilot will be comprised of two phases. The **first phase** will involve the applicant receiving *technical assistance* to complete their Brownfield Action Plan. The **second phase** will begin upon completion of the Action Plan, and will include grant funding of ap-

1. Assist selected communities in developing an **assertive brownfield action strategy** in a focused economic development area;

When do I apply? The Division plans to release the Request for Letters of Interest and application form on **Thursday**, **September 1**, **2011** with a due date of Friday, October 14, 2011. The Division anticipates awarding up to four pilot projects, which would be notified by the end of
